3. Human conquest

The most plausible view is that the horseman signifies the threat of human wars of conquest. This approach considers all four riders as a set, like the four groups of horses and riders in Zech 1:8–15 and 6:1–8, and it recognizes that all the horsemen are ominous. Like the violence, food shortages, and death represented by the other horsemen, the first rider points to a threat posed by the violent forces operative within human society.

The warning about the oil and wine has been variously interpreted. Some feel that it was added to underscore the social inequity existing in a time of scarcity. It is the poor, not the rich, who suffer. But in that case it would also be difficult to understand why the Lamb—the voice "among the four living creatures" (v. 6; cf. 5:6)—would issue an order favoring the rich and aggravating the plight of the poor. Others see in the oil and wine a reference to the sacrament (cf. Jas 5:14) and understand the clause to promise that believers will not suffer from the famine. It is simpler to take the phrase as indicating a natural limitation to the famine. Mounce

"Death and Hades" first appeared in 1:18 as the underworld (sheol). There it was a place or a condition. Here, Death and Hades are being brought to the earth.
