Right hand symbolizes power to bring judgment and salvation.

> **Exodus 15:6 (judgment)** Lord, your right hand is glorious in power. Lord, your right hand hattered the enemy.

Psalm 48:10 (salvation)

Like your name, God, so your praise reaches to the ends of the earth; your <u>right hand</u> is filled with justice.

Isaiah 41:10 (salvation)

Do not fear, for I am with you; do not be afraid, for I am your God. I will strengthen you; I will help you; I will hold on to you with my righteous <u>right hand.</u>

Could be that the scroll being in the right hand indicates that the <u>content of the scroll has to do</u> <u>with both judgment and</u> <u>salvation.</u>

Possible interpretations of the content of the scroll:

Revelation says that at the last judgment the books of human deeds and the scroll of life will be opened (20:12; 21:27). Since the Lamb receives the scroll from God and later passages refer to "the Lamb's scroll of life" (13:8; 21:27), the sealed scroll in 5:1 might list the names of the redeemed. However, this scroll's seals are opened in Rev 6–7, yielding threats, whereas the scroll of life is opened only at the end.

Soft wax and strings to prevent tampering. Only those authorized can break the seals.

That the scroll is sealed means that the content is <u>inaccessible</u>. In this case, God's will/plan for the is only actualized because of Jesus. <u>Jesus</u> <u>alone actualizes God's redemptive</u> <u>plan for the creation.</u>

"mighty angel" could indicate rank (though Revelation does not explicitly state that there is a hierarchy among angels).

it seems to the mighty angel that there is *no one* who is worthy (next verse)

<u>The implication</u>: Jesus is in a unique category as the only one who is worthy. Jesus is unique among humans and angels. 1. **Jesus is fully God**. Co-equal, co-eternal, and indivisibly united with God the Father and God the Spirit.

2. Jesus is fully human. Jesus can only redeem that which he has assumed. He must be human to redeem humans/ humanity.

Right/Orthodox Christology

3. Jesus has two natures (divine/human), but is only one <u>person</u>. Persons are acting subjects, natures are not. What is true of each nature is true of the one person ("communication of attributes")

Right/Orthodox Christology

As a result of the incarnation, the divine Son subsists and acts in two natures without changing the integrity of either nature, confusing them, or making them a hybrid of divine and human.

There is cause for weeping in Revelation (judgment), but this is not it. God's plan/will *will be* carried out.

Three dimensions of meaning to "slaughtered lamb"

This worship is a response to the lamb being the only one authorized to take and open the scroll. He's of special status.

Music is consistently a part of worship in the heavenly temple of God (the book of *tehillim*).

Offering bowls were common in Jewish and Greco-Roman worship.

"saints" (i.e., "holy ones") is a common term used for Christians because of the <u>cleansing of sin</u> <u>guilt</u>.

Christ's blood purifies all sin and therefore makes holy.
